


From the Foundation Chairman

MUSCULAR DYSTROPHY RELIEF FUND (MDRF) GRANTS

The Tall Cedars Foundation grant process is continually ongoing. Forests are encouraged to identify families in their local communities who could benefit from one of our MDRF grants. The forests, through their MD chairmen or committeees, work with families to complete a short application form. The Foundation Board reviews each application and makes funding decisions monthly. Families may apply for grants of up to \$5,000 per year. If needed, a process also exists for a second \$5,000 grant per year. These grants can be used to support various expenses, including travel costs for their child's treatments, costs to attend summer camp, specific equipment needed for their child, home accessibility renovations, and many other related expenses. We encourage forests to reach out to us and discuss the needs of their local families so we can determine the best way to support them!

Using its Muscular Dystrophy Relief Fund, the Foundation is also committed to supporting research that can help launch the careers of clinical researchers focused on developing therapeutics and a cure for muscular dystrophy and related neuromuscular diseases. Grants supported by the Foundation are awarded to non-profit organizations with direct relationships with these clinical researchers at some of the world's leading medical schools. Every few months, a non-profit organization with direct ties to research initiatives provides a brief presentation to the Foundation Board. The Board then considers their efforts and needs and awards them a grant. The Board will then work with that organization on a joint press release and follow up with them throughout the year to learn about the advancements that have been made.

THE LIFE MEMBERSHIP PROGRAM

Before 2025, the Life Membership program had a single level of recognition, which was achieved through a one-time gift of \$75 from a Tall Cedar. In 2025, the Board approved two program changes, outlined below. All current Life Members begin with the cumulative gift of their initial enrollment (i.e., \$75 or \$100, depending on when they purchased their Life Membership). As members make additional gifts, these are tracked, and when a new gift milestone is reached, they are presented with a certificate and a pin for their pyramid. The pin denoting your highest giving level is worn on the pyramid.



Once you've completed the form, print it off and mail a check (payable to the Tall Cedars Foundation) to the Supreme Forest office.

Please specify in the memo line that this is for a Life Membership.

Life memberships count toward overall forest donations for the purpose of the annual giving level award programs.

An easy goal: Every forest adds one Life Member (or has a member increase their level) per year.

MARKETING KIT UNDER DEVELOPMENT

As I mentioned in my address to the Kingdom at Convention, several brothers have asked for assistance in identifying families to help. The Foundation's long-range goal is to have each forest in the kingdom adopt one MD family. When you choose to adopt and support a family, you become eligible for the Dick Feeser Family Support Award (specific information about this program was recently sent via Groupable and is also available on the website). Furthermore, your forest becomes the conduit for that family to apply for an MDRF grant!

We recognize it might not be easy to find a family. You may have asked around, spoken about it at Masonic lodge meetings, and still struggle to identify a family. Here are a few strategies to help identify a family. Remember, my brothers, we're Masons and Tall Cedars – and we're here to help!

In response to this, your Foundation is developing a simple postcard-sized brochure you can distribute. The card will briefly explain who the Freemasons and the Tall Cedars are and share our commitment to helping families and children affected by muscular dystrophy or related neuromuscular disorders. The brochure will let them know we have a grant process and provide examples of the kinds of things our donations support. There will also be a space on the card for EACH FOREST to put their specific contact information. Provide the name, email address, and phone number of a brother the family can reach out to. This brother will be the key point of contact between the forest and the family and will coordinate the grant request process on behalf of the family and your forest.

We will ship these to the Forest Scribes along with some stickers on which this information can be written or printed and affixed to the space on the form designated for the local contact information. We ask that the forests enter their local information on the stickers, affix them to the brochures, and then distribute the brochures to their membership.

WHERE SHOULD YOU DISTRIBUTE THESE BROCHURES?

- **Masonic lodges (of course).** We want our brother Masons to know what we're up to, which may also help drive membership into the Tall Cedars!
- **Schools** – talk to the nurses or guidance counselors in the elementary, middle, and high schools. They cannot give you a name (because of HIPPA laws), but if you give them a few of these brochures and ask they give them to the families of kids with MD, that is something they can do. The family then can choose to reach out to you if they need assistance.
- **Doctor's offices** – Talk to the nurse next time you're visiting your Primary Care physician. Leave a few brochures with them, as they would also be able to connect with doctors in their practice who might see children with MD and could provide the family with your brochure the next time they see the patient.
- **Neurologists /Neuromuscular specialists** – Some of the bigger communities and hospitals may have doctors who specialize in neurological or neuromuscular diseases. These are the doctors who provide the specific MD diagnosis for the child. These doctors may also have relationships with MD patients and can be a valuable asset in helping spread the word if you were to give them a few brochures.
- **Physical therapists** – MD kids undergo A LOT of physical therapy. If you can find physical therapists who specialize in pediatrics, even better! Find the local physical therapists in your community and pay them a visit with a few brochures in hand. They may have some of the more regular contact with MD patients, and can serve as an excellent conduit to connect a family with your forest.



When you have the brochures ready to go, make an event out of distributing them. Divide the brothers into small teams of two or three. Have these teams visit the various locations—divide and conquer—to make the most efficient use of everyone's time and efforts. Then meet up afterward for coffee and fellowship to discuss and debrief how the effort went! 3. **KNOW YOUR REGION.** Signs will be posted with your forest name and number under your **REGION**.
4. Have your **current dues card** ready in order for the credentials team to verify your status.
5. Download Groupable Passport on your phone and install. This will provide your dues card electronically.

By taking these few steps to get your dues card electronically prior to getting to the convention and by registering as soon as you get to convention, we will be able to make this process much more enjoyable for you as well as for the credentials committee.

Most recently, he brought 40 2025 bears to this region for charity.

This Tall Cedar's name is Mike Pompura. He is a member of Westmoreland Forest 77. At the 2024 Convention, Jim Marion presented Mike with the Tall Cedar of the Year Award.

Indiana Wheel Chair Presentation


Brothers, I want to share something deeply meaningful from my own experience. I, Elliot Hartsough—a member of Tall Cedar Forest Adoniram #209 and an Officer of Glen Park Lodge #732—met Leslie Kneisley, a 61-year-old woman who has lived with muscular dystrophy her entire life and is also legally deaf and blind, through a manager at my workplace, Calumet Park Cemetery in Merrillville, IN. Service has always been a part of my family's identity: my mother serves our community as an Episcopal priest, and my grandfather on my father's side not only founded the crisis center in West Lafayette, IN, but also served as a hostage negotiator for the Indianapolis Police Department during the 1990s. Several other relatives have long been dedicated members of the League of Women Voters. With a family rooted so deeply in public service, I see myself as simply doing my part.

Leslie's story is both heartbreak and humbling. Though none of her children inherited her disease, she has faced unimaginable challenges. After losing her husband in 2019, the government seized nearly all of her assets when she had to be placed on medical assistance. The nursing home where she lived then banned electric-powered wheelchairs because their batteries would die in the hallways, leaving her with

almost no independence. When Jim Marion and I found her, she was pushing herself around with two toes—both covered in blisters—and she had been wearing her daughter Erika's old sneakers. Erika, who is 37 and the eldest of three, has been doing everything she can to care for her mother.

Thankfully, we are fortunate to have Jim Marion in our local forest, and his guidance and efforts were instrumental in helping secure the aid Leslie desperately needed. It's not every day that you have a Past Supreme Tall Cedar involved in a case like this, and his presence made a tremendous difference. Leslie is also the first person in the history of the Tall Cedars to receive aid above the age of 18. With the Foundation's approval of her prescription wheelchair, she finally regained comfortable and dignified mobility after years of struggle. We were also able to provide her with new sneakers, giving her relief and stability in her daily life. Each time I see her gratitude, I'm reminded of how fortunate many of us truly are. These experiences ground me, inspire me to manage my own finances responsibly, and continually reaffirm why I am committed to helping those who cannot help themselves."



We had our annual Barnyard Night in October. It's always fun to dress in flannel with our jeans and overalls.



2026 Educational Scholarships

1. Be accepted, or completed the first year, at an accredited institution in any Associate Degree, Baccalaureate Degree, Technical or Vocation Program;
2. Plan to attend on a full-time basis;
3. Be of excellent character, personal integrity, leadership, and community involvement;
4. Provide two recommendations from school administrators, guidance counselors, and/or teachers;
5. Provide one personal reference;
6. Provide financial need information;
7. Complete a personal essay of no more than 1,000 words outlining why education is important to themselves;
8. Submit an official school transcript;
9. Complete the Masonic Affiliation form; and
10. Complete a photo/video release form.

C. Postmark deadline for all applications is March 25th, with the awards being made in April.

D. All scholarship monies will be paid directly to the selected candidates.
